1. Using the amazing artwork of Andy Goldsworthy as inspiration you will create a nature sculpture. Andy Goldsworthy is a British artist known for his outdoor installations using natural materials. Working as both sculptor and photographer, Goldsworthy creates his artwork out of rocks, ice, leaves, or branches (whatever he can find in the landscape that he is in), then carefully documents these collaborations with nature through photography.



Your assignment is to go outside and using only natural objects create an interesting sculpture and photograph it. Then notice how your sculpture changes over time as wind or rain may affect it.

2. Thinking about the outdoor sculptures that you saw the video link above, I want you to design of a sculpture that you would want to place in front of Barnwell. Would it be a person? an animal? an abstract design? Please draw your design for the sculpture on a piece of paper and then describe why you picked this design to be place in front of Barnwell. Remember that you can see this sculpture from all sides so think about what the front and the back of it will look like. You can either write your description or create a recording (audio or video) of you explain your sculpture design to me. Here are some more examples of sculptures outside of buildings:



3. Create a found object assemblage sculpture. This means taking different objects from around your house (with parent permission) to be combined together to create something new. Assemblage sculptures can be permanently joined together with glue, temporarily joined together with tape, or just built on top of and balanced together so it can be built and rebuilt. Please take a photograph of the finished sculpture. Here are some examples and inspirations to get you started:
